

ONGAVA GAME RESERVE ANDERSSON'S CAMP

RATE SEASONS

Low season: 01 December to 30 June High season: 01 July to 30 November

RATE BASIS

Fully Inclusive (FI) - includes accommodation, all meals, twice daily scheduled Etosha National Park activities, park fees, all local drinks and laundry. Excluded from the rate are premium imported brands and champagne, gratuities, curio purchases and any other items of a personal nature.

Dinner, Bed & Breakfast (DB1) - includes accommodation, dinner, bed and breakfast. Excluded from the rate are all extras to be settled direct.

LOCATION

The 30-000 hectare private Ongava Game Reserve is situated in northern Namibia along the southern boundary of the Etosha National Park, south of Okaukuejo with Ombika Gate being the closest access to Etosha.

ACCESS

Self-Drive Basis The camp can be accessed by road; however, guests may not do self-drive activities in our private concession areas. Parking in camp at own risk.

Closer to the time of travel, we recommend that you contact your travel consultant with regards to road conditions which may be affected by seasonal changes, e.g. high rains.

The Owner/Operator/Pilot in Command needs to sign our Indemnity, Waiver and Disclaimer policy for authorization to land at our airstrip. In addition, the Owner/Operator/Pilot in Command is required to acknowledge the preferred supplier and self-fly-in information notice. Please consult your travel consultant, as all procedures need to be finalized in advance.

HABITAT & WILDLIFE Etosha Pan

Etosha Pan is the result of a geological shift that dramatically changed the course of the Kunene River. Its 5 000 km² / 1 930 sq. miles (120 km / 75 miles across and 55 km / 34 miles from north to south) were formerly an ancient lake. Today the Pan is mostly bone dry, the stark, parched white surface giving the Pan its Herero name, "Great White Place." The edges of the Pan give way to a surprising variety of vegetation types: from woodland and broad swathes of mopane, to open acacia-strewn plains and grasslands. Fringing the Pan are a number of productive waterholes that sustain the high density of large mammal fauna, from elephant and lion to vast herds of springbok, wildebeest, zebra, giraffe and gemsbok.

Ongava Game Reserve

On the southern boundary of Etosha National Park and forming a buffer to the Park lies Ongava Game Reserve, a 30 000-hectare (74 129-acre) private reserve. It is a haven to large concentrations of wildlife: notably lion, wildebeest, springbok, gemsbok, Hartmann's mountain zebra, red hartebeest, giraffe, eland and the largest population of the endemic black-faced impala outside of Etosha. The Reserve is also known for the successful reintroduction of white and black rhino. Ongava also provides easy access to the prime game viewing areas of central Etosha, Namibia's flagship national park.

Game Viewing

Guests at Ongava Game Reserve have the opportunity to view game both on Ongava and in neighbouring Etosha National Park. Large herds of plains game concentrate around the waterholes in the dry season, making for exciting wildlife viewing. Most general wildlife species are present on Ongava Reserve as well as within Etosha, including springbok, gemsbok, wildebeest, Burchell's zebra, Hartmann's mountain zebra, waterbuck, red hartebeest, giraffe, eland and the endemic black-faced impala. Lion move between the Park and the reserve and both black and white rhino can be seen.

Birding

Birdlife is prolific on Ongava with 340 species including Ostrich, Kori Bustard, White-tailed Shrike, Short- toed Rock Thrush, Hartlaub's Francolin, Rüppell's Parrot and raptors, such as Greater Kestrel, in abundance. Local specials include Namaqua Sandgrouse, Doublebanded Courser, Yellow-bellied Eremomela, Spike-heeled Lark and Acacia Pied Barbet.

ACTIVITIES

If booked into camp on a Fully Inclusive (FI) rate basis, the following scheduled camp activities are included in the rate:



- Morning and/or afternoon game drives in Etosha National Park in 3 x 10-seater open 4x4 Land Rovers. Each Land Rover accommodates a maximum of 9 guests.
- Night drives on the Ongava Reserve on request.
- Hot water bottles (during winter and on early morning game drives only) and lined ponchos are provided on game drives.
- Guided nature walks on the Ongava Game Reserve (seasonal & subject to qualified walking guide being available).
- Stargazing with a laser pointer.

On the FI rate basis, specifically, note that morning and/or afternoon game drives on the Ongava Reserve are NOT included in the rate.

Subject to the availability of vehicles and guides, morning and afternoon game drives on the Ongava Game Reserve may be possible, however, they cannot be guaranteed. If available, these will be offered and sold direct in camp to guests at extra cost.

On a dinner, bed and breakfast (DBB) basis, guests may self-drive into the Etosha National Park or book and pay for any of the scheduled camp activities below.

CAMP DESIGN & FACILITIES

- Recycled farmstead that forms the anchor of the main area fronting onto a thriving waterhole
- Main area comprises an undercover and open-air dining area, a spacious lounge and bar. Two open fireplaces in the lounge
- One pool in the main area
- Open fireplace adjacent to the main area.
- Sunken, water level hide at the waterhole in front of camp
- Curio shop and library
- During winter months, a gas heater is stationed in the main area
- Complimentary Wi-Fi access in the main area

ACCOMMODATION

Number Of Tents

This camp can accommodate 40 guests plus 6 guide/pilot/tour leaders sharing. 20 x units in total comprising:

- 16 x twin-bedded Meru-style safari tents each with two single beds
- 4 x double-bedded Meru-style safari tents
- The Family Units On request, two sets (total four UNITS) of the twin-bedded tents, each with their own bathroom and entrance, can be connected by a raised wooden walkway (approx. 20 metres long) to make "Family Units."
- A total of 5 mattress converters are available that transform twin beds into doublesize beds. To be arranged prior to arrival.
- Plus, guide/pilot/tour leader accommodation comprising: 3 x twin-bedded tents each with two three quarter beds and shared en-suite facilities (not of the same standard as a guest tent).

Unit Description

- Meru-style safari tents with a covered veranda on a raised deck with double door entry to allow for an uninterrupted view of the bush and gravel walkways on the ground.
- Each tent has a natural stone en-suite bathroom with flush toilet, basin and open air shower, mosquito net and luggage rack.



- Each tent has a small safe (keys remain with guests) supplied for valuables.
- During winter, hot water bottles and extra blankets are provided.
- No air-conditioning, however, a pedestal fan is provided in all the rooms. Liquid soap, body wash, shampoo & conditioner, body lotion, room spray, insect repellents, washing powder (for smalls), tissues dispensers, umbrella and laundry bag are supplied in each tent.

ELECTRICITY & WATER

- Power is supplied from the National grid.
- Fans and lights in tents powered by 220V.
- There are 220V electrical plug power points in the rooms. It is therefore possible to charge batteries as well as use appliances such as sleep apnoea machines, hairdryers or electric shavers during your stay.
- Solar-heated water for showers
- In major cities all electrical appliances run on 220/240V. Outlets are round 3-pin, 15-amp plugs. While some camps can supply adaptors (3-prong round, 3-prong square, 2-prong round, 2-prong flat), it is advisable that you carry your own.

EXAMPLE OF A TYPICAL DAY

Morning wake-up and activity times vary according to the seasons, activities on offer and wildlife sightings.

- Early morning wake-up call
- Light breakfast before departing on the morning activity
- Return to camp for a meal and rest period.
- Meet for afternoon tea before departing on the activity.
- Return to camp to freshen up or meet for drinks, followed by dinner and thereafter, perhaps a nightcap.

CHILD POLICY

- Children of 6 years and older are accommodated and partake in activities with all other guests.
- Children between 6 and 16 years must share with an adult/s in the same room.
- The minimum age for walking activities is 13 years.

LAUNDRY FACILITIES

Laundry is provided on a daily basis (weather permitting) and included on the FI rate basis, however, it is also available for guests on DB1 rate at an extra charge. Laundry slips are provided that guests must include with their cloths. Although the utmost care is taken with laundry, Ongava Game Reserve cannot accept responsibility for any damage or shrinkage. It is therefore recommended that guests hand wash their own delicate items with the washing powder provided.

PAYMENT FOR EXTRAS

The Namibian Dollar and South African Rand are the only legal tender in Namibia and can be used freely to purchase goods and services. **The Namibian Dollar, however, is not legal tender in South Africa.** Visitors may bring any amount of foreign currency into the country; however, Travelers Cheques and foreign currency can only be exchanged at any of the main commercial banks in the major centers of the country. We recommend that quests make use of cash or credit cards.



Ongava Game Reserve accepts US Dollars, GBP Sterling and Euro as payment for curios, drinks, gratuities, etc. International MasterCard and Visa credit cards are generally accepted throughout Namibia. Holders of other cards are advised to clarify with a commercial bank whether their card is acceptable in Namibia. American Express and Diners Club specifically are no longer accepted in Namibia. Most fuel filling stations do not accept credit cards as a form of payment.

TIPPING & GRATUITY GUIDELINES

We would like to emphasise that tipping is not a requirement and should be undertaken only by choice, dependent on the service received. If guests are pleased with the service provided, they may wish to add a nominal amount ranging between US\$ 10.00 to US\$ 30.00 per day for incidentals (subject to personal budget choice)

- Guides & Specialist Guides We recommend US\$ 10.00 per guest per day.
- General Safari Camp or Lodge Staff We recommend about US\$ 10.00 per guest per day for safari camps.
- Transfer Driver We recommend about US\$ 2.00 to US\$ 3.00 per guest per movement.
- Porterage We recommend about US\$ 2.00 to US\$ 3.00 per guest per movement.

We recommend tipping your guide directly and making use of the gratuity box in the main area for the general camp staff.
